#### A Chinese Proverb – not just for Christmas!

Out of all the content of that video clip, it was this phrase that struck me the most. Its simplicity, yet accuracy, gave me quite a 'moment' if I'm honest. And since then, I've been reflecting on it a lot.

Our season of Remembrance is upon us, closely followed by the great anticipation during Advent, and our wonderful celebration of Christmas and New Year.... All hugely significant events in our calendars and Christian seasons, acknowledged and celebrated in our churches and in our communities.

## *Revd. Jeremy Valentine* 9.7.38 – 28.8.19

#### Reflections from his daughter Kate

If Jeremy were here today he would have arrived a little late, and those of you at the back would have been able to hear him as he came up the church path, we would almost certainly have heard him laugh loudly by now, and he would tell us that this is not a funeral service we need feel sad in, but it is a service of celebration and

thanksgiving, for a long life, lived well.

Jeremy had an extraordinary ability to create fellowship and build communities, he had a unique stage presence that compelled his audience and colleagues to take notice of what he had to say. He took everyone at face value and accepted them for who they were, and he had a knack for spotting people's gifts and talents and encouraging them. He utilised these gifts as Headmaster of Cundall Manor School where, together with Sue, he created a school community that fostered independent and resilient children, encouraged them to climb trees, work hard in lessons, and eat well.

He followed his lifelong calling, was ordained a priest whilst at Cundall, and began parish life at St. Andrew's Huntington and All Saints. He found it quite difficult to start with but learned a lot about working in parishes and uniting congregations.

It was on coming here to the Harton benefice that he found his true fulfilment; he loved all the churches, and especially Bossall. He loved parish events, particularly if it involved a lunch! He had the same no nonsense approach he employed in prep schools; he had no interest in conflict or intrigue, if anyone tried to involve him in gossip or complain he would just say "Oh, I'd go and see Sister Margaret Ann if I were you."

He also loved his family and was a devoted Pop to his grandchildren; he has been such an important part of our family, bringing fun, silly songs, badly behaved dogs and some incredible Sunday lunches.

My parents were exceptional people, and I find it difficult that I am now without them both, but the lesson and legacy my father leaves for me is this; find fulfilment in the ordinary, accept people for who they are, work to your strengths and know what fulfils you, spend time in the company of people you enjoy, be generous, be kind and have fun; and if you ever feel lonely – get a dog! *May he rest in peace*

# 'Play and Pray'

Our recently established 'Play & Pray' pre-school group has met three times now at Sand Hutton church on a Monday morning.

It runs as a drop-in style session for parents/grandparents and carers of preschool aged children living in and around the Harton Benefice.

The sessions are great fun. Toys and books are available as well as table top activities. After the grown-ups have had a brew and a chat, we enjoy some circle time when the children have juice and a snack. We then say a prayer and do some singing and signing. We end with a prayer and off everyone goes!

Our 'sister' group meets at Warthill church and takes place on alternate Mondays. We are hugely appreciative to our Warthill families, for their support, especially Heather and Clare who have generously helped us get going. Families are encouraged to attend sessions in either setting if possible. This is generally happening which is great. In the longer term this will enable children from the Federated schools to get to know each other at the early year's stage prior to starting in Reception.

When 'Play and Pray' falls during half term, Pre-schoolers are welcome to bring along their older siblings!!

#### News, views and information from:

#### BOSSALL

It has been a sad three months for St Botolph's following the deaths of Richard Wheway, Teddy Denison and Revd. Jeremy Valentine, in quick succession during July and August. In different ways, each had given a great deal of their time and energies to this wonderful church during their lifetime and it was poignant that all three chose to hold their funerals and memorial services here.

**Richard Wheway** died on 9<sup>th</sup> July and his thanksgiving was held on 6<sup>th</sup> September. Apart from his regular attendance at services throughout the Benefice, Richard was an active member of the choir right up until his death, aged 89. His love of the Book of Common Prayer, and interest in church matters was highlighted by Chris Wingfield during the service, alongside many personal readings and a fascinating address by members of the family.

**Teddy Denison** died on 16<sup>th</sup> July, and his memorial was held on 13<sup>th</sup> September. With an attendance of just under 300, the church was stretched to the point of overflowing, with extra seats and a relay of the service laid on within the garden of the Old Vicarage opposite. A fitting 'send off' for a gentleman who had given much to this place throughout his life.

Having moved to the village in 1972, Teddy and Mary soon established that St Botolph's was in poor repair, and in desperate need of attention. Apparently locals would joke "If you go to Bossall Church, take your umbrella", as it literally had holes in the roof. Funds were short, but Teddy decided that this important 800 year old church was worthy of restoration, and he set out to establish avenues to achieve that. He was a key instigator of fundraising activities, but more importantly, he secured various grants, and encouraged legacy giving. Following the sale of Harton School the Strickland Estate donated vital funds and through his prudent investment has established a fine financial legacy to this day.

Alongside Mary, who was Churchwarden of St Botolph's for over 35 years, standing down earlier this year to help nurse Teddy in his ailing health, the pair of them gave hours of their time and energy to ensuring the church was

maintained and run in good order, and must be applauded for their time honoured service.

Revd Jeremy Valentine died on 29<sup>th</sup> August, and his funeral and burial took place on 12<sup>th</sup> September. Much has already been said about Jeremy's achievements in the parish, but he was of course the very popular vicar of the Benefice for some twenty years, continuing to take services post retirement until last year. He had asked specifically to be laid to rest at St Botolph's. His service was a celebration of his long and interesting life, with a stunning and beautiful eulogy given by his daughter Kate.

#### BUTTERCRAMBE

Thank you to everyone who supported our Harvest Festival service and lunch afterwards at Aldby Park on Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> September. We had a terrific turnout with thirty six people attending for lunch. £300 was gathered in donations and the raffle which has been shared out between Ryedale Carers Support, York Down Syndrome Parents Group and St Johns Buttercrambe.

#### Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> December at 10.00 Nativity and Toy Service. This tradition began over fifty years ago. In recent years numbers have dwindled. Are there any budding actors out there, age 2 years upwards, who would like to join with us to keep this tradition going?

It doesn't matter if you don't attend church on a regular basis. It involves 3-4 rehearsals for approximately one hour per session. Together with the much larger sums needed to repair the church tower, etc. this puts a considerable strain on church finances. Over the last three months, we have held some interesting events in St Mary's. The church is yours as parishioners; the PCC members are only there to manage its activities and affairs.

**The Village Hall** moves from strength to strength, with an increase in bookings for 2020. It is a valuable asset for the village. We enjoyed a very jolly harvest supper in the hall in early October after a service of Songs of Praise in the church, led by the Rector, Chris. Thank you to those who decorated the church so beautifully and to everyone who helped so generously in the Village Hall.

#### BOOK REVIEW.....



During the Summer I read 'The History of the Bible: The Book and Its Faiths'. Author John Barton was Professor of the Interpretation of Holy Scripture at the University of Oxford and is an Anglican priest.

This book explains how the Bible came to be constructed from its beginnings to the present; how and when the narratives, laws, proverbs, prophecies, poems and letters were written.

It suggests sources in folk-lore, myth and tradition behind them, and how they were shaped by

authors, scribes, editors and translators, to eventually evolve into the canon we have today. It also introduces the ideas of religious thinkers from Augustine to Luther, revealing how faith and the Bible have related down the ages.

John Barton describes how distinctively the books of the Old Testament function for the two religions of Judaism and Christianity. The main study for Jews is about God's faithfulness to the Patriarchs, the Laws (given to Moses) and the gift of the Promised Land. There is no emphasis on salvation, but rather on divine leadership, the fortunes of people from Abraham and his descendants in Israel, and the observance of the Torah – the teachings and advice of the Hebrew Bible. For Christians over the centuries, the Bible tells of disobedience to God and redemption, sin and salvation, paradise lost and regained, prophecies fulfilled for all people in Jesus Christ.

Though a scholarly book, writing is clear and succinct, in sections one can read in a sitting and pick up later on. I found it a most absorbing and interesting book. Many examples of biblical passages accompany the complex layers of interpretation that can be teased out, suggesting allegory and metaphor as well as literal meaning. I think this book will send readers back to the sacred texts with fresh eyes.



I wonder if readers of the Circular would like to recommend books that they have found interesting and helpful in their faith.
