From Rev Nigel.....

Winter has finally given way to Spring, and there is new life all around. The blossom has come and gone, and the trees are spreading their leaves. There is an increase in the sound of birdsong as the days get longer and warmer. It felt at times over the past few months that the rain would never stop. Planting has been delayed and new lambs have had to be kept inside because of water-logged fields. But I was pleased to see some out in fields as I was driving to a recent meeting in Crambe.

There is a newness in the air for our ten churches too, as they move forward with their new vicar. I am absolutely delighted to be that new vicar. I say new, but I have been in situ for a year as Assistant Curate prior to my collation by the Bishop of Selby in St Mary's Sand Hutton on 11th April. Photos of the service can be found on the Harton Benefice website. The Harton Benefice is a wonderful place in which to minister. I am truly blessed.

As the weather improves, I will be out and about on my motorcycle, and maybe even my bicycle, stopping off in our villages in order to meet people where they are. If you see me do come and have a chat.

I'm really keen to find out what is happening in the lives of the people living in our Benefice area. Of course, I want to talk about what our ten churches are doing and how Jesus is working amongst us, but I'll talk about anything. If you get me into a conversation about motorbikes, hill walking or dogs, be prepared to talk for a while!

For me it is important to let everyone in our communities know that I am here to minister to everyone wherever they are, and not just in the churches. Jesus travelled around with his followers in order to meet people where they were. In chapter 4 of John's Gospel, we read about the encounter between Jesus and a Samaritan woman at a well. Before that time, the Samaritan woman would not have believed that such a conversation could possibly take place. The Jews of the time considered Samaritans to be unworthy and ritually unclean. Jesus accepted her for who she was, even knowing that she had something of a dubious past.

Our church doors are open to anyone, no matter what personal or emotional baggage they carry, and I am here to be a minister and a friend to all who want or need one.

As I said, come and speak to me. Oh, and I'm always up for a cuppa!



Sending all our love and best wishes to you Dot. The children created some lovely wreaths, grown-ups wrote prayers, and the ladies present were presented with a daffodil posy.



Why don't you come along to our fortnightly sessions at Upper Helmsley allotment/church and see what we do?









Over the thirty years that I have lived within what is now the Benefice of Harton, I have had the privilege of getting to know some incredible people. Lots of local characters like Lordy of Foston, Norman Cresse from Harton, Ron Townsend from Gate Helmsley, Mollie Kennedy from Crambe, Frank and Freda Spaven from Claxton, Jane Herbert from Upper Helmsley, the Fosters from Buttercrambe, and so many more who have served both their communities and churches faithfully over the years. Now it's time to say 'goodbye' to the Walters from Harton. Ian and Angela have given us all so much as well as being our local milkman.

I remember when I first came to the area in the early 90's it was Alwyn and Kath Walters who ran the business then, with Ian helping out. Then he took over and was assisted by Guy, Luke and Angela. I remember too Elizabeth Todd from Harton who helped them during the school holidays, riding across the fields on her bicycle. It was a real family business. They have always been there for us all. I saw them most days at the cottage delivering either the milk or papers or both. Even in really bad weather they always came. We used to say, 'if Ian can't get through the snow and ice, nobody can'. They would pass on news around the villages; perhaps someone wasn't well or had been taken into hospital or had moved away, or died in the night. They knew their customers well and if anything was wrong they were alert to it, always interested and concerned and willing to help. They would do anything for anyone where needed.

Angela had another string to her bow. She became known as the local 'Flower Lady'. Her great love of flowers showed in so many ways. Her garden at Cherry Tree Cottage was beautiful, as were her flower arrangements in the churches. She made beautiful bouquets for special occasions, and arrangements for the Flower Festival.

In the early years, after helping Luke with a school wreath making project one Christmas, Angela placed one on my cottage door. She has continued to do one for the cottage every year since. They are always beautiful, each different from the last, and much appreciated. On my 70th birthday I was presented with a most lovely bouquet that Angela had made for me.

It was always a privilege to be involved in all the highlights of their family life, and to walk alongside them in times of sadness which included Alwyn and Kath's funerals at Hovingham, and Angela's mum's at Trinity Methodist Church in Norton.

Thank you, Ian, Angela and all the team for all you have done for us and the community over the years, and Ian, you will always be my favourite milkman, only don't tell James and Michelle who have taken over the milk round!

We wish you well in your retirement, a well-deserved rest, and we hope the move to Stamford Bridge goes smoothly. May God go with you and bless you in your retirement.

BOSSALL

Along with many other churches in the Benefice, Bossall was pleased to have been able to participate in the great big Easter Egg hunt, and we took great pleasure in welcoming a very healthy number of young 'chocolate hunters' over the Easter weekend. Well done Rachael for all her hard work in setting this initiative up, and doing most of the organising.

There have been challenges with ongoing wet and boggy conditions in the churchyard and grass verges around the church in Bossall, with added complications of a plethora of moles this winter. Apologies to those who struggled to park at the recent Sunday service on 7th April. However I am delighted to report that we look now to be getting on top of the moles, and the first decent grass cut has been done at last, so we hope the coming months will see us getting the place looking more presentable! As ever the daffodils have been magnificent, and the churchyard remains a sought-after place to sit and admire the views as well as the peaceful environment we are so fortunate to call 'home'.

We can also announce that the second phase of major remedial works resulting from our Quinquennial review got underway this week, 15th April. As the attached photos show, the whole church has been stripped back to fully expose all the timbers, and we have been undertaking a full and comprehensive treatment for woodworm and death watch beetle. This

required a total 'spring clean' of all exposed surfaces, as well as the clock/bell tower, which generated a skip load of rubble, bird droppings, and general detritus. Not pleasant work. The process has involved heat treatment of the altar area, all pews and moveable furniture, with all roof timbers getting sprayed with approved chemicals. It's been a very significant undertaking. The church remains closed for a few days but should be open again week beginning 22nd April.

This will leave us with the final, but largest phase of works still to complete. That will involve repairs to defective stonework, upgrading and renewal of external drainage and the re-installment of rainwater guttering, all of which has been tendered now with costs in excess £150,000. We are still actively looking to raise funds to meet this necessary funding requirement.



BUTTERCRAMBE

Sadly, we lost Don Gregson in March aged 94 who had been a resident of the village for many, many years. He moved to Ranbeck Cottage nearly 50 years ago to work as a gamekeeper which he did until he retired. He came from Hull and some can remember that this gave rise to much mirth with regard to his dialect! He was an enthusiastic gardener and grower and after he was widowed became a very keen cook. For the last 10 years he has lived in the white cottage in the middle of the village. Many will have noticed his colourful display of roses when driving through Buttercrambe. He was much liked and respected and will be missed enormously by his family and friends.

CRAMBE

Life plods quietly on in the little hamlet of Crambe. With such a wet and windy Spring everyone has kept a pretty low profile keeping warm and dry. However, the rainy days were brightened up considerably by the emergence of all the spring bulbs that had been planted in the churchyard in the Autumn. Hopefully they will multiply over the years providing a cheerful carpet of colour for villagers and walkers alike to enjoy. Many thanks to Paula and her team of helpers for all their hard work.

Grass cutting has begun and a huge thank you to Sam Cook who gives his time so generously to mowing the paths that wind through the churchyard and the 'smart' bit at the front.

After what has seemed like for ever, we have finally got started on the French Drain which is being put in round the nave. Once finished this will allow us to get on with improving the driveway and access for all, including those with buggies and wheelchairs.

We are delighted that Nigel has been collated into the post of Vicar of the Benefice of Harton, wish him well, and add our warmest welcome to those of the rest of the benefice. We look forward to working with him in trying to ensure that St Michael's Church will continue to serve the village of Crambe long into the future and make its contribution to the wider community.

FLAXTON

We have recently had two burials of ashes in the church Garden of Remembrance. Mrs Catherine Bourne (11th March) and Mrs Sylvia Hodgson (4th April). Both families had connections with Flaxton.

Thank you to all who came along to make the Pancake Party held in the village hall a huge success. The age range was 2-92. This year the newly formed Social Committee for Flaxton joined us helping with shopping and cooking of pancakes. Thank you everyone. A huge thank you to Jill, Catherine, Helen and Luke for organizing the Pancake Tossing Competition and to John for running the raffle.

This is not a fund-raising event and costs were covered by the raffle, sale of glasses of wine and donations for extra pancakes. There was £20 left over and it was agreed this would be given to the Salvation Army.

We are happy to be able to report some items of local cheer, which in a small way serve to balance some of the bleak news coming from distant parts of the world.

First, we offer congratulations and a very warm welcome to Reverend Nigel Benson on his appointment as the new Vicar of the benefice of Harton. We have already been able to get to know Nigel as he has spent the last twelve months as our Assistant Curate. We look forward to working closely with him over the coming years.

We have had some happy events in the church, with more to come over the summer. We offer congratulations to Charlotte Owbridge and Steven Badger who were married at St Mary's on 3rd April. We look forward to a baptism in early May and another wedding in early June.

We are sad however to report the recent death of Dick Garnons Williams. 'Captain Dick', as our grandchildren knew him, was a stalwart supporter of St Mary's church. We will add more when we have further news from the family.

Easter Sunday saw a full church for the Easter Day Holy Communion service, a joyous occasion at which the Reverend Rachel Benson presided, and the Reverend Nigel Benson preached. Thank you both.

Rachael Harrison, benefice lead for children and young people, organised an Easter egg hunt in all 10 churches in the benefice. St Mary's participated for both days of the Easter weekend. The church and churchyard were visited by 8 families, which included 13 children. Much chocolate was consumed. We are really pleased to receive visitors into our church, which is open every day. Drinks and biscuits are always available, and we value the positive comments that people make in the visitors' book.

The PCC recently received the Quinquennial Inspection (QI) report. Churches are inspected every five years by a nominated church architect. The report makes recommendations, with time scales, on repairs and refurbishments needed to maintain the church fabric. Although no urgent repairs are needed, work costing more than £100,000 is required for 2025-26. This is mostly to repair the rainwater goods to reduce the dampness in the church. So please watch this space for future intensive fund-raising.

On the fund-raising note, our continued thanks are due to Claire and Dan Sykes for the enjoyable monthly pop-up pub sessions. By the time this goes to press the Race Night they have organised will have taken place (on 20th April). We are grateful for the funds from these events which are shared between the village hall and the church.

We are very dependent on volunteer help. A huge “thank you” to all those who give so much help with the maintenance of the churchyard. You know who you are. We don’t always know who you are as you just quietly do what you think needs doing without expecting anything in return.

Community Climate Action Group for Harton Benefice Area

Professor Colin Garner, Sand Hutton, as a concerned citizen, has set up with others a local Community Climate Action Group for the villages that broadly make up the Harton Benefice.

One of the initiatives is to look at Energy Performance Certificates (EPC) for our villages. If you let a house or if you have transferred a house in recent times there will be an EPC for your property. But if you have not and are interested in doing some works to your property to improve the thermal efficiency or to generate more electricity or other zero carbon measures, then it would be worthwhile commissioning one as a first step. They cost less than £100 (typically £80) and will give you some good insights as to what is most likely to reduce your energy consumption and save you money. The certificates list possible actions in priority order. It is a very valuable way of identifying where any money you choose to spend should be targeted first.

EPC's are valid for 10 years so if you are planning to transfer the property in the near future, you will need one at that stage anyway.

So far we have researched the EPC data for the villages of Buttercrambe, Scrayingham, Bossall, Sand Hutton, Skirpenbeck and Claxton. Zero carbon will be achieved when all houses are at band A and currently none are!

There is an interim target to get properties to band C as a minimum and currently Scrayingham is the winning village with 36% of properties at band C or above, chased by Sand Hutton on 28%, Buttercrambe on 24%, Skirpenbeck at 22%, Bossall with 7% and Claxton at 3%. So, we all have a long way to go!

If you Google EPC assessors there is a good choice locally. However, Helen Pirozek from Wiggington attended the Saturday social in February to speak about EPCs and has been used by a number of people on the CCAG group who recommend her. Helen can be contacted on helen@yorkepc.com or 07941 956332.

The CCAG also has a thermal imaging camera which can be borrowed to assess your own property. In the next Circular we will explain how that operates and what has been learnt so far.
