#### When the Saints go marching in....

The first of November is All Saints day and marks another of those changes in the year. The clocks will have already gone back and we look to a season of Remembrance and waiting as we journey towards Christmas. And as we journey through, our church life takes up the theme of saints – which always makes me feel slightly uncomfortable if I'm being honest.

In our hymns they always seem to be doing things I'm not quite sure aboutwhether it's resting from their labours, shining in glory, rising in bright array and streaming through pearly gates. It all smacks a little bit of being too heavenly minded to be of any earthly use en masse. Too often our hymns and popular culture might give us the distinct impression that on days like All Saints the church is only interested in looking back on its past glories with a large dose of nostalgia and distinctly rose-coloured stained glass windows. Those who we describe as saints often seem to be in some kind of sanctified retirement - All Saints' Day is about celebrating but it's not just about the past - it's about the present and the future of the people of God and our place in that great company.

One of the saints I find most inspiring would be Dietrich Bonheoffer, a German pastor and theologian who led the Church's opposition to Hitler, and was killed by the Nazis in a concentration camp in 1945. Among his writings is a remarkable book called 'The Cost of Discipleship'. In that book he celebrates the mundaneness of those called to be the community of saints which is the Church – a band of justified sinners. He writes:

'The community of saints is not the ideal church-community of the sinless and the perfect. It is not the church community of those without blemish, which no longer provides room for the sinner to repent. Rather it is the

#### church community that shows itself worthy of the gospel of forgiveness...It is the community of those who have truly experienced God's costly grace...'

So being a saint is not like passing a GCSE or A level in holiness – it's not something you do on your own. In Christian tradition the saints are part of the crowd that surround us within the Church and in what we call the Communion of Saints – living and (as the Salvation Army would say) promoted to glory. When we speak in our creed of the fellowship or communion of the saints we have the assurance that many stand alongside us in solidarity, both those who have gone before and those who live Christ's life throughout the world today.

As the church we are holy, we are saints. Being saints is what binds us to others in church – whether they are down the road in York or Middlesborough or facing hardships in Middle East or Africa. The communion of saints is standing within a greater congregation - interacting, interceding, in solidarity with us in our struggles, our celebrations, our pains and our joys. Being part of that is about us all together striving to be Christlike.

A Scottish hymn from the Iona community puts it like this

In this crowd of common people, Once unknown, whom we revere, God calls us to share his purpose Starting now and starting here. So we celebrate his calling, So we prize and praise his choice, As we pray that through this company God will act and raise his voice.

Maybe as we journey towards Christmas, we too can recognise the saints who live in our communities of 'common people' - those who live out Christ's story of kindness, generosity and forgiveness.

And maybe... just maybe... by their example of being more Christ-like, we are called to be a saint as well.



#### from Sister Margaret Ann CSPH

It has been my privilege to be involved in two or three Harvest Festivals in the Benefice recently, and what a joy that always is. Thanks to a lot of hard work from volunteers, our churches looked beautiful, full of flowers

and greenery from our gardens, and fruit and vegetables. I love the smell of Harvest. One church decorated their ledges with Virginia Creeper and the red, yellow and orange colours against the grey stone was stunning. Then there is the feast afterwards, which we are in the Benefice of Harton, really good at and it's different everywhere you go! And what an opportunity to share our good fortune with others and enjoy the community spirit which it all generates.

Nearly always there is a loaf of bread in the display symbolic of God's gifts to us. Looking at the bread got me thinking. I went back to the sixties and seventies when places like Romania were going through political turmoil. I remember seeing pictures on the television of supermarkets with completely empty shelves and that made such an impression on me. I started to think about that basic food we all take for granted I guess! Have you ever thought about bread? In our supermarkets (most of the time) there are shelves and shelves of it and the variety is vast, white, brown, wholemeal, seeded. Large loaves and small, cut and uncut. Brown and white rolls, baps, bagels and finger rolls. There are fruit loaves not to mention naan bread, wraps, pitta bread and so on and so on. It is endless.

So just for a minute or two let us think about bread.

**B** It is **BASIC**, everyone, wherever, whoever, whatever you are need it and in this country the variety is overwhelming and on the whole readily available.

**R** We all **RECEIVE** it as part of our everyday and I guess with very little thought, as if it is our right. As Jesus once said 'I am the bread of life, anyone who comes to me will never go hungry and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. So it feeds not only our bodies but also our souls if we allow it to.

**E** We **EAT** it, enjoy it and are energised by it enabling us to renew our strength to carry on our work whatever that might be.

A Here in Britain it is for us ALL unlike the third world countries, where so often food is scarce and men, women and sadly children know what it feels like to be starving. I wonder if as you sit down to your meals you think beyond your table to those less fortunate than ourselves and give thanks to God for all his bounty to us? As part of harvest festival thanksgivings food gifts and collections are given to charities to further their work and are used where there is a need. Sharing what we all have here, an abundance of everything.

**D** And finally bread for us is **DAILY** and as the Lord's prayer reminds us – 'Give us this day our daily bread' Everything we have comes from God our heavenly Father.

So the next time you reach for the bread, whatever sort you choose, remember the many across the world today that don't have that luxury. Jesus once said 'It is better to give than to receive' so as you sit down to your next meal remember to say whether quickly in your heart, or out loud, a 'thank you' to the God of Life for the food we enjoy daily, and remember these words from the well known Harvest hymn:



'He only is the maker of all things near and far He paints the wayside flower and lights the evening star The winds and waves obey him by him the birds are fed Much more to us his children he gives us daily bread.

#### GATE HELMSLEY

The cooling weather and shortening daylight hours remind us of the ending of summer and the beginning of winter. Let's hope that this winter brings better things than the last one.

This time last year, we managed to deliver "harvest in a bag" to all our parishioners. This year we were able to celebrate harvest thanksgiving in person in Gate Helmsley village hall. Chris Wingfield led a harvest Evensong service after which we shared a different kind of harvest supper. Thank you to Chris and to everyone who helped with this event. We were fortunate to have extra helpers this year, both from the village and from St Peter's Upper Helmsley. Thank you all for your hard work.

In order to keep everyone safe, we served the supper in a cardboard box and paper bag. This proved ideally suited to the menu: a variety of sandwiches and home-made delicatessen, with cake, fruit, cheese and biscuits. There were several other benefits – absolutely no food waste, a ready-made "doggie bag" to take home next day's lunch, easily recycled packaging and minimum washing-up – only the coffee cups and saucers.

Because of Covid, the harvest festival was one of only two fund-raising events we were able to host over the last eighteen months. Over the evening we raised £730 for church funds, a welcome contribution to the depleting church coffers.

Because of St Mary's shortage of both human and financial resources, we organised a public meeting in mid-August with the title "Save it or Close it". A good number – though only a relatively small proportion of the village population – attended the meeting and we also received encouraging messages from others who were unable to be there. There was unanimous support to keep the church open.

This may well be possible with additional help from parishioners. Some have already put their support into action, committing to making a regular financial contribution to the church. Practical help is also being given with fund-raising and with churchyard maintenance. We are very grateful. 


